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FROM THE PASTOR

Our Session, in consultation with our Pastoral Nominating Committee and with an invitation from the Session of Calvary United Protestant Church, the Presbyterian church in Park Forest, has decided to **yoke** with Calvary to search for a full-time *shared pastor*. Our PNC has discovered that finding a qualified part-time pastor is difficult at best. Our financial situation is such that we cannot, in good conscience, commit to a full-time long-term pastor. Calvary, having had three part-time pastors in six years, has discovered that part-time pastors do not lead to stability, which is so important in our “unprecedented times.”

While I was in seminary, I was the student supply pastor for two and then three yoked congregations for a year each. My first call after seminary was to two yoked congregations. The easiest way I know to describe what “being yoked” means is that it is like having a roommate to be able to afford a nicer home and NOT like being married. Too easily folks might suspect this yoking is a round-about way to merger. Two things: first, this has NOTHING to do with merger. Merger, in the Presbyterian Church, comes from the bottom up and CANNOT be forced by Presbytery. Second, yoking comes from two congregations figuring out how to find the best way forward to a vital ministry in each *separate* community.

If I were the person considering the call to these two congregations, the fact that there are similar core values would encourage me. When the congregations are very different, a pastor easily becomes a soccer ball kicked back and forth. If I were looking for a call with forward looking congregations that make vitality and longevity likely, these two congregations with shared values for community involvement, music, faith formation and strong lay leadership would encourage me.

While this may be a direction in which most of us thought we wouldn't be moving, I believe it to be the possibility that leads each congregation to a bright future.

STEWARDSHIP/FINANCE MINISTRY TEAM

One of the recent gifts to the church was a stock donation of 430 shares of highly appreciated stock. The donor has applied the donation to his/her pledge tax free for 2020. At present, the shares are in the church’s TD Ameritrade account to be sold when favorable market conditions occur. The estimated value of the sale is \$7,100. Similarly, two Required Minimum Distributions from the retirement accounts of the donor(s) for 2020 pledge giving arrived in mid-September. The total amount for these two RMD’s was over \$7,600.

These recent gifts give proof to the fact that donations from stock and retirement funds are non-taxable by the IRS for the donors if given directly to the church. There is still time in 2020, so talk to your investment advisor. Anyone can save on paying income taxes on the sale of stock shares and retirement fund shares by making such donations as tax exempt pledges to the church.

During this time of holding virtual Sunday worship services, we do sing the Doxology and offer a prayer of dedication for the weekly offering. Every member or giving unit has a box of offering envelopes to be used when an offering is mailed. Please use your envelopes with your box number so we can accurately record your giving to your statement. When your next statement arrives in the mail, check your progress toward your 2020 pledge and Per Capita. Please don’t fall behind. Our search for our new pastor is in progress.

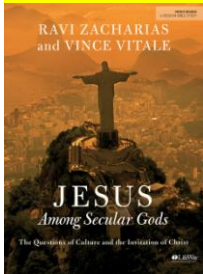

WEDNESDAY NIGHT ZOOM CLASS WITH TIM



We’ve dipped into science and history with our first few classes on apologetics. Now we’re going to take a chance to look at philosophy. How do the philosophical teachings of Jesus size up to other competing philosophies that have grown to popularity in recent decades—hedonism, pluralism, scientism, and others? How should Christians respond to these ideas? Do they conflict with the teachings of Christianity?

Our new course is *Jesus Among Secular Gods* by Ravi Zacharias and Vince Vitale. There is a subtitle of *The Questions of Culture and the Invitation of Christ*. Class is held weekly on Wednesday evenings at 7 p.m. on Zoom. For a copy of the Zoom link to join the class, please contact tlvannasdale@gmail.com.

Here is a brief description of the course from the website:

“As belief in the secular gods of atheism, hedonism, relativism, and humanism continues to grow, it’s more important than ever for believers to be able to defend and share the claims of Christ. Of course, this clash of worldviews is nothing new. Throughout Paul’s writing in the New Testament are references to elemental forces that seek to separate believers from the love and truth of Jesus.

“Not only has the Christian worldview been devalued and dismissed by modern culture, but its believers are also openly ridiculed as irrelevant. This six-session Bible study challenges the popular and trending philosophies of the day, skillfully pointing out the fallacies in their claims and presenting compelling evidence for absolute truth as found in Jesus and revealed in Scripture. Learn how to confront the empty promises of cultural philosophies and develop confidence sharing the claims of Christ.”

Elements of these secular ideas have shown up in every conversation that I’ve had with nonbelievers and in many conversations I’ve had with believers as well. All worldviews attempt to answer some of the deepest questions in life. *What’s the meaning of life? What is my purpose? What will happen to me when I die?* In this class, we will explore the most successful and popular

secular responses to these challenging questions and compare them with the answers provided in Christianity. Knowing what these competing philosophical concepts involve and what challenges they pose to the teachings of Jesus can be super helpful in evaluating and strengthening our own beliefs as well as helping us to address questions when the opportunity arises to give reasons for the hope within us (1 Peter 3:15).

DELAYED SESSION REPORT

Regular Session Meeting, October 26, 2020

The story of creating a yoked church relationship with Calvary United Protestant Church, Park Forest, continues. Both Sessions have now met each other on a Zoom conference call. Each Session has named a three-person delegation to the common yoking committee. Representing First Presbyterian Church of Homewood will be Kathleen O'Hanlon, Jay Ruklic, and Ron Shropshire. The purpose of the yoking committee is to discuss both immediate and future details of church operations. The Sessions will then receive recommendations, reach conclusions, and make decisions. With the assistance of our respective representatives from the Presbytery of Chicago's Commission on Ministry, the Ministry Information Forms for both churches must be brought into alignment.

With the sanctuary closed to in-person worship, Session decided to not ask for our members to purchase flowers for Christmas decorations. Using the same money that would have been used to buy the flowers, we are asked to donate through the church to either Respond Now! or to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. More details on this will follow next month in *The Carillon*.

Two Special Worship Services are coming in November. The first is the virtual Special Service for Healing and Wholeness (Veterans' Day theme) on Monday, November 9, 2020, at 6:30 p.m. **The second is the virtual Thanksgiving Eve Special Service on Wednesday, November 25, 2020, at 7 p.m. on Zoom.** With so many of our members and visitors not allowed to safely travel for the holidays this year, these extra services will help in keeping and uniting us in worship and fellowship.

After literally years of research, study, and discussion, the Personnel & Administration Ministry Team under Elder Kathleen O'Hanlon (chair) received the last missing wording from our insurance company for the Sex Offender Policy. With that wording in place, Session voted to approve the new Sex Offender Policy.

Rev. Elvery requested approval to lead a special Christian Education Advent Bible Study on the theme of "*Names for the Messiah*," by Walter Bruggeman for four weeks on successive Tuesdays beginning November 24, 2020, at 7 p.m. The series will be hosted on Zoom. Session approved. [Books will probably be available. Watch our website for particulars.]

Active Member Jonna G. James passed away on Wednesday, October 7, 2020. Rev. Elvery officiated her funeral service. Her remains were buried at Abraham Lincoln National Cemetery.

Rev. Jane Tuma returned to lead worship on Sunday, October 18, 2020, while Rev. Elvery was on one week of unpaid vacation leave in Tennessee.

Elder Kathie Hazlett shared statistical information on the activity on the church's website. Over 300,000 visits, or hits, have been recorded so far. Interest in our virtual Sunday worship services continues to climb. The numbers are very general and lack specific detail, but the trend of the traffic is encouraging.
